# Burning Regulations

**Make sure you know the rules** for outdoor fires and follow safe practices. Each year dozens of residents and cottagers across Ontario lose structures and property to fire caused by careless burning. Your Fire Department would like to remind you that **outdoor burning regulations are enforced between April 1 and October 31**. If you burn, follow these steps:

## Choose a safe time

Any fire is most likely to get out of control on a hot, dry or windy day. Burn during the coolest dampest and calmest time of day. **Two hours before sunset, or later, and extinguish two hours after sunrise.** Don't even consider burning when it is windy. Be aware that in the spring after the snow melts and before the grass and buds have started to grow, it is extremely hazardous to burn.

## Choose a safe site

If you are burning an area of grass or leaves, make sure the area is surrounded by a fireproof boundary. Roads, ditches or ploughed ground provide good barriers against fire spread. Your fire should be at least 18 meters (50ft) away from any structure or forest debris that might catch fire.

## Put that fire out

Remember, coals can smolder for hours and hot embers can be blown by the wind, easily setting fire to dry grass or twigs. Drown hot coals thoroughly, and then cover with sand or gravel.

## Stay in control of your fire

Many injuries are caused by careless use of flammable materials and underestimating fire behavior. Never use gasoline to start your fire as it is highly explosive. A responsible person must be available to tend the fire at all times, even if it is contained in an incinerator. You must have adequate tools (shovel, rake) and water on hand to control the fire if it begins to spread. Use caution around hydro poles and be aware of over head and underground cables. Be sure your fire does not cause irritation or inconvenience to your neighbors.

## Keep your fire small

Small fires can be controlled by one person using hand tools and water. When burning piles of wood, brush or wood by-products make sure it's less than 2m (6.5ft) high and 2m (6.5ft) in diameter. Keep your fires limited to one pile burning per acre. Burning an open field is not a good idea, but if it is necessary make sure you have the equipment and people available to do it safely.

## **DON'T BURN DURING THE DAY**



---

It is your responsibility to be aware of the Rules, Regulations and By-laws pertaining to outdoor burning in this area. Your municipality follows the provisions of the Forest Fire Prevention Act. The O.P.P. and M.N.R. have the authority to lay charges if you are found negligent.

At any time the M.N.R or Fire Department may ban or restrict outdoor burning in this area until further notice. Be aware that if a forest fire results because you have used fire improperly, you could be held responsible for the cost of putting out the fire and any property damage that may occur.

## 2022 Municipal Election: Notice of Nomination for Office

**The nomination period for the next Municipal Election opened on May 2, 2022. It closes on Nomination Day August 19, 2022 at 2 p.m.** A Candidate for Municipal Office must be a qualified municipal elector in the Municipality and meet all requirements. Nominations must be on the prescribed form and accompanied by the prescribed nomination filing fee of \$200.00 for the Head of Council and \$100 for all other offices. The filing fee is payable by cash, certified cheque, money order or electronic payment if specified by the Clerk. Chemical waste is both dangerous and harmful to humans, animals, and the environment. NEVER throw hazardous waste into the garbage or flush it down the sink, toilet, or storm sewer.

**Hours of Operation:**  
Wednesday to Saturday  
8:00 a.m. to 6:00 p.m.  
Open Year Round

Bring all your HHW and electronic waste to the Hazardous Waste/Electronic Drop-Off Depot at 112 Patton St. This service is **free** to North Bay residents.

Hours of operation (year round): **Wednesday to Saturday 8:00 a.m. to 6:00 p.m.**

## Accepted Materials:

- Adhesives/glues
- Aerosols
- Antifreeze
- Batteries (all types)
- Cleaning supplies
- Cooking oil
- Cosmetics
- Fire extinguishers
- Fluorescent lights
- Fuels
- Oil and oil filters
- Paint, varnishes and stains
- Pesticides
- Pharmaceuticals
- Pool chemicals
- Propane (all sizes)
- Sharps\*



**NOT ACCEPTED:** Unidentified items, items with refrigerants (AC units, fridges, freezers, water coolers, dehumidifiers), PCB's, explosives, biological/pathological waste, radioactive waste.

**Disposing of Sharps\*:** Please put sharps in a sharps approved container. You can acquire a sharps approved container at your local pharmacy, free of charge. You can also place them in a container and tape the lid of the container shut and label sharps on the container. Bring them to the pharmacy or to the Hazardous Waste Depot.

**There are limits to how much waste you can bring per trip.  
DO NOT BRING MORE THAN 60 LITERS AT A TIME!**

## RECYCLING BYLAW CHANGE



Due to covid measures the Municipality passed a temporary Bylaw allowing some divertable material to be included with garbage. This now has been recinded and will no longer be allowed.

Sections 8 and 9 are expected to be followed. Please ask landfill staff for better information on recycling or and questions.

Thank for keeping Calvin's landfill lifespan in mind.

## ROOTS AND BRANCHES OF CALVIN - Pauline Carmichael




Imported from Merritt B.C. where she met her husband David Carmichael.

They moved back to Calvin in Feb 1974 and started the Galston Ranch. They calved out 50 cows at a time and have slowly whittled down to 22. One of her first thoughts was: *"Where the hell did Dave take me!!!!"*, as she had never experience black flies before.

They have two daughters Kimberly and Jennifer and two grand daughters.

Pauline first started to work as a waitress then she started at UOP which is now Columbia as the first female lead hand. She worked at the Calvin township landfill for 17 years. She has been the Wild Life Damage Investigator for the past 6 years and an insurance adjuster for the past 30 years for AGRicorp. She has also been on the Vet Services committee for 28 years

Dave attended the Agricultural College in New Liskeard as one of the first students to attend and get a degree in the 2 year agricultural program. Dave was a Calvin Councillor for 3 years and Reeve for 25 years. That is when Pauline became involved in the Rec Committee and was on it for 7 years. During that time, they worked on the Centennial Yearbook for Calvin and she wrote three articles for the book. She remembers that year to be a great time. She coordinated with the Firefighters auxiliary and the Calvin's Women's Institute with the Halloween Dance, the New Years Eve Dance and the Winter Carnival. She said that back then, they had a lot more available volunteers to help out. A memory that stands out for Pauline was in January 2000 at 6am when everyone thought the computers were going to crash there was an earthquake that was felt all through Calvin.
